### Our guest speakers this month:

**Donna Renfro** has spent half her professional life in some form of education, and the other half owning businesses. She is currently serving as the Director of Religious Education at the UU Fellowship of Northern Westchester in Mount Kisco, NY. She is pursuing a Masters of Divinity at New York Theological Seminary, is in 'Candidate' status for UU ministry, and is a member of Core of Fire Interfaith Dance Ministry and an Interplay leader.

Donna spent her first ten years in a Southern Baptist church, where her Sunday School lessons of Jesus exemplifying kindness, compassion, teaching and inclusion became her lifelong highest values. She returned to church in her forties, to the Unity Church of Practical Christianity in Houston, looking for a religious home that lived her Sunday School values, and was more interested like she's always been, in how Jesus lived and taught, rather than how he died. Donna eventually found she needed more inclusion, of theology and social justice in the wider world, and found herself having that 'coming home' experience in a UU congregation in the late 90's.

**Rev. Michelle Collins** is currently serving as the assistant minister at the First Unitarian Church in Wilmington. Though new to Wilmington, she has lived in the Baltimore-Washington area for a number of years, leaving only to attend seminary in Berkeley, at the same time as Rev. Charlie! She has previously served as a chaplain at Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore and as a grand fool with the Faithful Fools Street Ministry in San Francisco (and been a grand fool ever since!).

# Reverend Charlie's Page

From "The Army" The great prince issues commands, Founds states, vests families with fiefs. Inferior people should not be employed. (The I Ching, Wilhelm/Baynes)

The first mystical book I ever read was a translation of *The I Ching, or Book of Changes,* a set of Chinese wisdom writings which predates Confucius. Hellmut Wilhem's translation and interpretation of the text came out in a new edition around 1967, and popped up in popular culture in several places. (By the way "*I*" is pronounced "E" or "Yi".)

The I Ching is a set of sixty four wisdom writings, each with six additional related wisdom writings. And then there are commentaries and commentaries on those commentaries. By flipping coins or some other act of divination, the user is led to a particular wisdom text, perhaps with additional texts. The selection method also creates a "hexagram", a set of six lines, either solid or broken. In the case of The Army the hexagram can be seen as one strong line (the General) with two columns of soldiers ahead of him/her and staff members behind:

I am not knowledgeable about the religious use of the *I Ching*, but I heard of several different uses in the 1970's. You could use a text as you might your daily horoscope. You could use it as a starting point in a creative process - a painting or poem. Or you might use it as a framework for decision making. For example, the short piece quoted above might remind a corporate executive that she is not running everything by herself, and that her job is to find good people to manage the parts of the corporation.

Our theme this month is "Transitions" which could mean something like graduating, as in our Religious Education Sunday and Bridging Ceremony. It could mean a change in the seasons (and the weather) or work schedules. It could mean finding a new way to be you, tapping in on your subconscious to "re-frame" reality, new ways of thinking -- even re-imagining the meaning of your life -or leaving old goals behind. It's no wonder that Carl Jung wrote the forward of the translation of *The I Ching*. He felt that reactions to images and patterns such as hexagrams, and texts might help an individual scrutinize his/her "own character, attitude and motives." This could be used as a tool to reveal mental "blind spots" and open a person up to change. He also warned that the method of *I Ching* is "open to every kind of misuse... nor is it for intellectualists or rationalists." I find it is a way of challenging my own ways of thinking, not revealed divine truth, but rather an invitation to imagine differently.

I will be gone to the UU General Assembly in Louisville on the week of June 17th, so no office hours that week. Feel free to e-mail me anytime though. And I do have regular Wednesday office hours 10 am to 2 pm at the UU Center on the other weeks. Please come visit for lunch and watch the birds!

## "Harvest the Power" A Leadership Development Program

The Adult RE Committee is excited to present a leadership development program entitled "Harvest the Power." An overview of the program from the UUA website states:

Many Unitarian Universalists experience a deepening commitment to their faith and congregation as a call to accept a position of leadership — as a lay worship leader, a leader of children or youth or a member of a task force, committee or governing board. Leaders need a broad range of skills, both technical and visionary. The program's 12 workshops offer opportunities for both new and experienced leaders to enrich the skills they bring to their leadership and to experience their leadership journey as a Unitarian Universalist faith journey.

While the whole program consists of 12 sessions, they are divided into 3 sections of 4. We will present the first segment of sessions, one through four, beginning on Thursday June 13.

Session One is entitled LEADERSHIP JOURNEY and serves as an introduction to the Harvest the Power program, presenting key concepts and inviting participants to share their own leadership stories. The workshop will offer theological grounding for faithful leadership, based on the work of Unitarian theologian James Luther Adams. It will help participants develop their identities and skills as UU lay leaders. Thursday June, 13.

Session Two is entitled UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST JOURNEY and deepens lay leaders' sense of identity as UUs by building knowledge and understanding of our UU history and heritage. Each participant will share their own path to Unitarian Universalism. This session will assist participants to articulate and share their journey to UUism and examine lay leadership from a UU perspective. Thursday June 27.

Session Three is entitled POWER AND AUTHORITY and helps participants distinguish between power and authority and between leadership and management. The group will explore the implicit and explicit expectations of congregational leadership. The workshop will provide a framework for participants to examine the complex expectations of people in leadership roles and will help relieve anxiety about being a leader. Thursday July 11.

Session Four is entitled TURNING POINTS AND MOMENTS OF GRACE and will introduce the idea of turning points or moments of grace; times when events or circumstances lead our lives in new directions. Participants will also consider conditions that can lead a congregation to a turning point. Thursday July 25.

We are encouraging people to sign up for all four sessions, but each session is also designed to be a "stand alone" session. You can sign up for any sessions that interest you. ## Book Group Plunges into Nail-Biting Amazon Adventure in June with *State of Wonder*

s there nothing the prodigiously talented Ann Patchett can't do?" asked the *Boston Globe*, reviewing *State of Wonder* (2011). NPR declared simply, "This is a masterpiece of a novel." Don't miss this narrative set in a jungle world of danger and surprise, a story rich in emotional gravity and moral complexity. "Reading this book will cause you to call in sick, cancel all plans, and return to page one upon completion." (*People*)

Join us on Friday evening, June 21 at 6:30 pm (half an hour early) in the UU Center Library to talk about Ann Patchett's enthralling novel—her sixth, some even say her best. Debbi Dagavarian will moderate this final meeting of the year. We will also be choosing 10 new books for 2013-14 (thus the earlier time), and confirming a new UU Book Group facilitator. Newcomers are welcome; come and get acquainted before the summer break.

Ann Patchett was born in Los Angeles in 1963 and raised in Nashville, Tennessee. She attended Sarah Lawrence College and the University of Iowa Writers' Workshop. Today she lives in Nashville with her husband, and is the co-owner of Parnassus Books.

State of Wonder was named a "Best Book of the Year" by the Washington Post, Miami Herald, Time, and both NPR's Fresh Air and Weekend Edition, among others. Her third novel, The Magician's Assistant, was short-listed for England's Orange Prize and earned her a Guggenheim Fellowship. Her fourth, Bel Canto, won both the PEN/Faulkner Award and the Orange Prize in 2002, and was a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award.

In June we choose 10 new books, and you are encouraged to send one or two choices right away to Judy Pereira at <u>igpereira@comcast.net</u> to get the new list underway. Suggested at the May meeting were *Birdsong* by Sebastian Faulks (fiction); *Wild: From Lost to Found on the Pacific Crest Trail* by Cheryl Strayed (non-fiction); *The Physician* by Noah Gordon (historical fiction/#1 of a trilogy); *The Glass Room* by Simon Mawer (fiction); and *The Orchardist* by Amanda Coplin (fiction).

And previously: A Deadly Mission (2010) or later mystery by the Rev. Judith Campbell, Unitarian Universalist Minister who lives near Cape Cod. (The protagonist of her novel is a reverend who teaches at a small, all-women's college in Boston. After a series of murders, she and her close friend, a gay priest who teaches at another college, begin to suspect a local religious organization of cult behavior.)

What book would *you* like to suggest? We want to gather at least 15-20 possibilities to allow for a rich and diverse mix of titles. Mark your calendars to remember to arrive a half-hour early, so we can settle on our choices with enough time to give *State of Wonder* its proper due. — To foster **COMMUNICATION** among ourselves by providing an atmosphere of openness, honesty and safety; and by ensuring that while listening respectfully, we take care to hear every voice.

— To show **RESPECT** for one another by acknowledging our differences; by listening without interruption; and by remaining openminded, humble, and patient in our interactions.

— To provide **SUPPORT** for each other by being present and engaged through times of joy and sorrow, harmony and conflict; by relating to each other with compassion and gratitude; and by cultivating a sense of fun and adventure in our spiritual quest. — To build **TRUST** in one another by behaving with integrity in our relationships; by being accountable for our actions and reactions; and by respecting confidences.

— To promote **RESPONSIBILITY** among ourselves by contributing our time, efforts, and talents in meeting the needs of the congregation; by being willing to lead and be led; and by being open to the risks of new experiences.

— To practice **FORGIVENESS** by allowing ourselves and one another to be less than perfect; by making every effort to settle our differences directly; and by keeping an open mind and heart.

We understand this Covenant is a living document that will be revised and updated as needed.

### Board of Trustees H I G H L I G H T S

#### May 2013

The **regular monthly meeting** of the **UUCSJS Board of Trustees** was held on Wednesday, May 15, 2013 at 6:30 pm at the UU Center, President Karen York presiding. A chalice lighting was selected from "Illuminations: a Unitarian Universalist app" by Vice President Dagavarian, shared principles were recited, and joys and concerns shared.

#### • ANNOUNCEMENTS

1) The next **Board Talk-Back** is Sunday, May 26 after the service; future dates are posted in the UU office.

2) President York will circulate for comment a new **growth grant proposal** to be submitted to the Growth Committee of our sponsoring congregation, First UU of Wilmington, DE, by about June 1.

**3**) The annual UUCSJS gathering at **Murray Grove** is set for Fri., Sat., Sun., June 14-15-16, 2013. See Heidi Jannsch for more information.

**4**) This year's **UUA General Assembly** (GA) will be held June 19-23 in Louisville, KY. UUCSJS has credentials for up to three (3) GA delegates.

**5**) It was announced that Joey Terrazzini has submitted his applicant essay and been accepted for this year's **Youth Civil Rights Journey**, July 6-13, 2013.

#### DISCUSSION/ACTION ITEMS

1) The UUCSJS Annual Meeting is scheduled for Sunday, June 9, 2013; the notice and accompanying documents went out May 9, one month ahead of time as required in the bylaws. a) Annual Reports of staff and committees are due to Board Secretary Judy Pereira by Monday, May 27 (Memorial Day), so they can be compiled and distributed to the congregation a week before the Annual Meeting. b) It was unanimously agreed the following resolution on "next steps" be placed before the congregation for approval at the Annual Meeting: "BE IT RESOLVED THAT the congregation hereby directs the new Board of Trustees taking office July 1, 2013, to offer congregational sessions as a means to further the implementation of the new UUCSJS Covenant of Right Relations." c) The one additional candidate needed to stand for election to the Committee on Ministry (COM) will properly be nominated by the minister; his elves are busy searching. **d**) The preliminary Agenda calls for election of delegates to the UUA General Assembly (GA); however, at the moment no one from UUCSJS other than Rev. Charlie is planning to attend. Procedures for absentee ballots will be reviewed.

2) Coverage of Office Administrator duties. It was verified that coverage of principal tasks continues the same as last month by a combination of staff and volunteer effort. Although there are no plans to fill the position before the end of the current fiscal year, the opinion was expressed that first steps toward doing so ought to be on the agenda at the first meeting of the new Board in July.

**3**) **Transitional Board Meeting June 12**. This meeting on Wednesday, June 12 at 6:30 pm in the UU Center Lounge will be the now-customary new/old Board transition and visioning session attended by staff and incoming members. The new Board president and vice president for fiscal year 2013-14 will also be elected at this meeting.

**4**) The Joseph Priestley District (JPD) hopes to establish a new program to support full-time, called ministers wishing to take sabbaticals with help covering pulpits and pastoral calls, for example. President York pointed out this information is offered for future reference, as at present our minister is at 70%, and not full-time or called.

#### • REPORTS

1) *Minister's Report*. Adding to his regular written report, Rev. Charlie said the focus in June will be on minister evaluations by the Board and COM and his own self-evaluation, all of which are due July 1 to the UUA Ministerial Fellowship Committee. Upcoming travel will include attending the year-end Priestley-Kingsbury chapter meeting of the UU Minister's Association on June 4 at Main Line in Devon, PA, and a pulpit exchange with Michelle Collins, Assistant Minister at First UU in Wilmington. Collins will deliver the June 30 sermon at UUCSJS, and Rev. Charlie's going there August 4.

He also described having worked on our electronics and said the Lobby can now receive sound from the Sanctuary! And being able to videotape sermons again is very important, and he said this is being worked on.

**2**) **Treasurer's Report**. In the treasurer's absence (on vacation in Great Britain), President York reported the call for special donations to help cover our unanticipated tax liabilities had an excellent response. She said that personally, she heard no negative feedback, and many supportive comments, concerning this financial obstacle. Board member Art Wexler spoke for others in thanking the president for her well-written request letter, which was sent electronically to the entire membership and suggested 5-10% of one's pledge amount as a guideline for giving.

It was noted the fundraising concert by jazz artist and guitarist Gina Roché had earned UUCSJS several hundred dollars net and the concert was very well-received. Roché generously shared with us a portion of the proceeds from CD sales and agreed to appear again at another time. The Fundraising committee is already considering improvements to increase the success of these types of events in the future.

In conclusion, York said she and Kathleen Hartnett, our Congregational Bookkeeper, will be monitoring account balances carefully in the treasurer's absence, checking the mail for bills, and so forth, and so on.

• **Adjournment** – The next meeting of the Board was set for *Wednesday, June 12 at 6:30 pm.* The meeting was adjourned at 7:45 pm, and reconvened immediately in Executive Session in order to consider:

2) Minister Evaluation.
