Cynthesis

Reflections by Rev. Cynthia Cain

Forgiveness is an easy word to say, but it takes a lifetime to master. The *Course in Miracles* (we have a study group here at UUCSJS) says that you will never be free until you have forgiven everyone you have ever known or can even imagined.

Many people, upon hearing that, are ready to try. They will work hard to forgive everyone... "except." Almost all of us have some excepts. After all, some human behavior is so outrageous and horrific that forgiveness is hard to even contemplate. Even if we could manage to forgive all of those who have harmed us, what about those who hurt children? Commit atrocities? What about Hitler?

Forgiveness is not a one-time act that we humans can perform and be done with. It is rather a way of living in communication with the world and humanity that says that we will allow for redemption, and that, although we need never tolerate abuse or torture or genocide, we also need not spend our precious days and moments in vengeance and bitterness.

I think the reason Rosh Hashanah is such a valuable high holy day for the Jewish faith is that every year, at the turn of the year, Jews are required to ask forgiveness of G_d and especially of one another. To me, this is testimonial to the ongoing struggle and journey that forgiveness entails: one that will last a lifetime.

Finally, the *Course in Miracles* says, at the end of our life we will, of course, forgive ourselves and everyone else. As we age, we experience the veracity of this. We might call it *letting go. So why not start now?* it asks.

The services this month will deal with both individual and community/global forgiveness. As we examine the meaning of forgiveness in light of the UUCSJS covenant, it is my hope that we may also begin a discussion about what will be required, going forward, to make that covenant a living, breathing document. Generally, that means defining and committing to the behaviors, boundaries, and actions that will ensure this community is safe for all, and that individuals have bound themselves together in agreement to keep it that way. Your leaders have begun that conversation, but all must be included.

To that end, I'll also be introducing a curriculum entitled *Safe Congregations*. This will be encouraged for leaders and core members, but open to everyone. Look for details in the next month or so.

These are the beginning steps toward your decision about **calling/hiring a Minister** after the Spring of 2016. I look forward to this year, and to working toward that goal together.

Meanwhile, I encourage everyone to attend services on January 25th. On that Sunday, our JPD District Executive, the **Rev. David Pyle, will visit UUCSJS**, deliver the message, and meet with others afterward.

Here's to a happy, healthy & forgiveness-filled New Year! *Cynthia*



Train to Selma 50th Anniversary March 4-10, 2015





Selma, and the Central East Regional Group (CERG) and Joseph Priestley District invite you to travel to Selma as our fellow UU's did 50 years ago.

The issues for which people marched across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma are still very much with us today. Voting inequality, mass incarceration, gun violence, the militarization of police, civil rights violations are as much a part of our country now as they were 50 years ago. Our country remains rooted in institutions of systemic racism.

Board of Trustees

HIGHLIGHTS

December 2014

The **regular monthly meeting** of the **UUCSJS Board of Trustees** was held on <u>Wed., December 17, 2014</u> at 6:30 pm in the Lounge at the UU Center, President Art Wexler presiding. Chalice lighting words were spoken, and joys and concerns shared. President Wexler made reference to the awful school shooting on Tuesday by Taliban militants at the Army Public School in Peshawar, Pakistan in which some 145 persons, mostly children, were tragically killed. He shared his anguish at humanity's failure once again to comprehend that in "taking an eye for an eye, everyone is blinded."

Jon Luoma recalled how Barbara and Jack Miller's exchange student, Mehwish, returned home to Pakistan and learned her uncle was a victim of violence there. Following a period of collective silence, the meeting commenced.

Announcements

—The next **Board Talk-Back** will be held <u>Sun., January 11</u> <u>at 11:15 am</u> in a lower level classroom.

—**JPD** (**Joseph Priestley District**) **District Assembly**. President Wexler announced that the next District Assembly, "Weaving the Fabric of Our Faith: *A Tapestry of Impact, Innovation and Interconnection,"* will be held <u>April 10-11, 2015</u> at the ACE Conference Center, 800 Ridge Pike, Lafayette, PA. ["It's an ideal place for a conference..." –TripAdvisor reviewer]

Keynote speakers will be **Mark Bernstein**, Central East Regional Group (CERG) Regional Growth Development Consultant (and UUCSJS Primary Contact), and **Patricia Infante**, CERG Faith Development Consultant. Registration and details will be available soon, according to the CERG website.

—"H-UULTI" courses from CERG. Karen York reminded us that <u>also this spring</u>, CERG's UU Leadership Training Institute (UULTI) will offer courses through "H-UULTI: The Hybrid / Online Team-Based Leadership School." She announced that the Philly Cluster of UU congregations, of which UUCSJS is a member, will provide tuition for <u>two</u> (2) participants per congregation for these classes. York said she hopes we can interest enthusiastic, newer members in signing up. <u>More information</u> will be forthcoming.

Reports

- 1) *Treasurer's Report*. Treasurer Karen York distributed her written report showing figures for **November 2014**, as follows: **Income**, **\$31,188** (*year to date:* \$89,360), and **Expenses**, **\$15,710** (*year to date:* \$70,932), for a net of income over expenses of \$15,478 (*year to date:* \$31,194). "Income greatly exceeded expenses due to the successful annual auction income," the treasurer stated.
- —**CC3 update**. Treasurer York reported that "the general canvass phase of the Capital Campaign 3 [CC3] has been completed, with **53 pledges totaling \$130,513**." Although the goal of \$150,000 was not fully met, the drive is viewed as a success; extra payments to reduce mortgage principal have already reached some \$48,478, she said.
- —**Auction fundraiser**. Proceeds from this year's event on Sat., November 15 have now reached \$12,990—well exceeding the budget estimate of \$11,000.
- **—Other**. The treasurer said that congregant Carl Benner walked her through the process of selling our Solar Renewable Energy Certificates (SRECs), which the Finance committee has determined should be done twice a year (December and June). Through broker Flett Exchange, the eight (8) credits accumulated through May 2014 were sold for \$1,495 (with a \$2.50 processing fee for each).
- —A motion to accept the written report of Treasurer Karen York as presented was passed unanimously by those present.
 - 2) Minister's Report. In her monthly report, Rev. Cynthia

Cain said that to date she has met with about two dozen UUCSJS members, friends, and former members. In responding to the question, "Where is all this leading?" she offered two early recommendations, with more to come: a) that UUCSJS sponsor a 10-week course of study on "Safe Congregations," led by herself and one other, and b) that UUCSJS hold a workshop on "Beyond Categorical Thinking in Ministerial Transitions," led by Rev. Keith Kron, the UUA's Director of Transitions (formerly, Ministerial Settlement).

As a "heads-up" to Board members, Rev. Cain passed out copies of the UUA's three-page questionnaire, "Interim Progress Appraisal," Appendix G of the *Transitional Ministry Handbook*. This form will need to be completed at the interim minister's "mid-term," and again at "end-of-ministry."

- —A motion to accept the written report of Rev. Cynthia Cain as presented was passed unanimously by those present.
- **3**) **Staff & Committee Reports**. DRE Heidi Jannsch informed the Board that the CRE committee plans to submit an application for Stockton student participation in construction of the children's play area, which began on Blue Jean Sunday, for Stockton's MLK Day of Service in January.

Although no Board action is indicated at this time, it was noted that alterations to the landscape, and how we manage exterior space, may have insurance or other ramifications. Thus, in her role as treasurer, Karen York agreed to see if there are insurance implications with respect to the new play area.

Discussion/Action Items

- 1) "Professional Expenses" budget increase. On behalf of Music Director Barbara Miller, the treasurer requested approval to increase the Music & Sunday Services budget for "Professional Expenses" (line 77) from \$400 to \$1,200 for Fiscal Year 2014/15. The increase helps cover costs of Miller's attendance at the recent UU Musicians Network (UUMN) conference in San Diego, and the upcoming JPD Worship Arts Festival. The Board fully supports her participation in these events, and the UUA's Music Leadership Certification Program.
 - —A motion to approve the amount was passed unanimously.
- 2) Disruptive Persons Policy. On behalf of the Ad Hoc committee in this matter, Melissa Hutchison reported that after reviewing documents the group agreed that the UUA's sample "Policy Regarding Disruptive Behavior" was "perfect" for adoption as the official UUCSJS policy. The committee recommended Board approval of the policy effective at once, which is applicable to members and non-members alike.
 - -A motion to approve the policy was passed unanimously.
- 3) Rev. Pyle's visit. On Sun., January 25, 2015, the JPD District Executive, Rev. David Pyle, will deliver the sermon and remain for a luncheon meeting. The Board, Transition Team (Π), and Rev. Cain will be joined by Staff members for lunch and a discussion on goals for the interim ministry, then after a short break, the Π and Board will stay on to discuss the ministerial search process.
- **4) Pachamama Alliance rental**. The treasurer requested approval to reduce the building rental fee from \$200 to \$100 for the Delaware River Valley Core Team of the Pachamama Alliance, for the purpose of hosting an "Awaken the Dreamer Symposium" on <u>Sat., April 18, 2015</u>.
 - -A motion to approve the fee was passed unanimously.

Adjournment - The meeting was adjourned at 8:36 pm.
