I am somewhat surprised that we've reached this point: the last two months we'll be together. I feel sad about leaving this incredible place that *you have created*, with your determination, your fortitude, your care and kindness, and your goodwill. I know how hard that is to do!

My first (intern) ministry was with a tiny congregation that met in a school gym in rural Virginia. They've grown to purchase a building, but are still just at half-time ministry. While in Lexington, I worked with a group from Frankfort to try to start a congregation there. (Since it is the state capital of Kentucky, we felt strongly there should be a church!) But, to this day, the very small group have not grown, nor have they declared themselves a congregation or secured a permanent home.

So it is with wonder that I look upon your accomplishments!

The hurdles that lie ahead are not as monumental as you may think. You are well on the way to securing a minister that will stay with you for a while, help you grow enough to comfortably inhabit your space, and companion you as you articulate and achieve your next set of goals.

This month, I'll be talking with you, and inviting you to work with me to envision some of the ways that you can be ready for your next ministry. Note that on the 22^{nd} , I'll be using food as a metaphor. I need about **ten** people to bring something they have prepared, and be ready to serve it to a small group. Let me know if you can do that!

So... for me, once I have left, I will return to Kentucky, at least for this year. I plan to take over the care of Seth, while we see if my husband's new employment works out. All three of my grown children are in Kentucky now, so that will be a first, and a joy. I have three writing projects I want to complete. I have a few health issues I would like the time and space to try and resolve without allopathic medicine. I'll be watching from afar to see how you do. My fervent hope is that you'll continue your great work with the Black Lives AC project, and extend the remarkable partnership we have begun, in imaginative and inclusive ways.

I may do another interim sometime in the future. I hope to visit you all when I come home to NJ to see family & friends. You'll be able to see whether I've gone back to saying WAH-ter and Y'all, instead of WAR-ter and youse! Meanwhile, I look forward to the coming two months.

UU VESPERS

Did you ever wish there were a time of UU worship other than Sunday? Come join us for UU Vespers, Friday, May 13 at 6 pm. Barbara Miller will lead a 20 to 30-minute informal service of sharing, silent meditation, prayer and music. If you have experienced our Winter Solstice Singing Ritual, you know how incredible it is to be in our sanctuary around dusk. Following is a paraphrased description of the Vespers service at Corvallis Oregon UU by Reverend Jill McAllister. Note her connections of Vespers to nature, including the vesper sparrow and iris:

If you have one association with the word "Vespers," it may be its use as a name for the evening prayer service in Christian traditions. Or, it may be the vesper sparrow that comes to mind, a large North American sparrow with a habit of singing in the evening.



Or perhaps the vesper iris, whose flowers open in the late afternoon as day turns to evening and late summer turns to early fall. The English word "vesper" comes from the Latin word "vesper" and the Greek word "hespera," which both simply mean "evening." A Vespers service, as the word is used in many Christian traditions, is a service suited to the evening: a quiet service of prayers, songs and silence, for settling and centering at the close of a day. For those who follow a practice of praying at regular times each day (for example, the Liturgy of Hours). Vespers is the final prayer of the day.... For us, Vespers services do not follow one specific tradition. ... Some Vespers will be contemplative, and others will be more active and participatory. ... We will strive to be like the vesper sparrow, letting ourselves touch and sing about what is going on within us and around us. And like the vesper iris, we will try to open to the transitions in our lives, the smaller movements and the larger movements that arise.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the **ANNUAL MEETING of the UUCSJS will be held in the Sanctuary of the UU Center on SUNDAY, JUNE 5, 2016 at 11:15 am** (immediately following the Sunday service) for the purposes of approving the budget for the 2015-16 Fiscal Year; electing members of the Board of Trustees and Nominations Committee; receiving the report of the Ministerial Search Committee; and transacting such other business as may come before the congregation. *By order of the Board,* Judith G. Pereira, *Secretary,* UUCSJS Board of Trustees

~ Notice will be distributed to members' email addresses of record as available, and others by regular mail, no less than thirty (30) days in advance of the meeting, as the UUCSJS Bylaws require; in other words, on or before May 6, 2016.

Three Ways to Vote:

1. By attending the meeting in person (you must be a member in order to vote). (A quorum must be present in order to conduct the business of the congregation.)

2. **By Absentee Ballot** – An Absentee Ballot will be available and must be received by the Board secretary <u>before the start of the Annual Meeting</u> at 11:15 a.m., June 5, 2016 in order to be counted.

3. By Proxy – A Proxy Letter signed by the absent member authorizes another member to vote on the absent member's behalf. Members may easily create their own proxy letter. The proxy letter names the proxy and states that said proxy is authorized to vote on behalf of the named member at the meeting named and is properly signed and dated. The proxy letter shall be presented to the Board secretary or to the meeting moderator on or <u>before the opening of the Annual Meeting</u>. No member may vote more than two (2) proxies per meeting. A proxy is valid for one (1) meeting only, and <u>can be used on all matters other than the amending of bylaws</u>.

Murray Grove Annual Gathering

Each year members of our congregation get together for a cookout and gathering at the Murray Grove historical site and retreat center located in Lanoka Harbor, NJ (Exit 74, Garden State Parkway). This year's gathering will be Friday, June 10 to Sunday, June 12. Murray Grove is an important historical site in our Universalism heritage with a history dating back to the 1700's. We are fortunate to be located so close to this special place and this gathering is an opportunity to relax, get to know one another better, and explore our Universalist roots. Friday night there will be cookout/potluck dinner and campfire. Saturday we enjoy an indoor pot-luck dinner. Sunday will include a participant-led Children's Chapel/Sunday service. There is also a labyrinth to enjoy, a ga-ga pit and playground for the kids, and swimming is usually available.

Everyone is invited and kids especially enjoy the event!

Overnight accommodations are dormitory style housing with two twin beds per room and shared bathrooms. We have 30 spaces available if you want to stay overnight. The congregation will purchase food for breakfast and lunch. To offset expenses, we are requesting a donation of \$25 per adult and \$10 per child per night, or \$50 per adult, \$20 per child for the weekend (babies free). All children must be accompanied by an adult.

A donation of any amount will be gratefully accepted, and please do not let the cost keep you at home. If you can't join us for the full weekend, please consider coming up on Friday for the cookout or Saturday for a portion of the day.

During the gathering we will need help with the cookout, campfire, and with organizing activities and intergenerational games. If you have a hobby or activity to share with folks (Yoga, Zumba, birding, arts & crafts, etc) this is a great time to share it with other members of the congregation.
