About our speaker Richard Grzywinski...

Richard Grzywinski is a Renaissance man. Read on, and you will see why he merits that description. He and his wife, Cynthia, had been UUCSJS members in the past and Richard just recently joined again. Our beautiful, green building would not have been completed in such a rapid speed, high quality, and at such a lower cost if it hadn't been for Richard's efforts. A retired engineer with undergraduate and graduate degrees in engineering and an MBA, he served as volunteer manager of the construction of the UU Center, supervising the labor of other volunteers and workers, a year and a half-long project.

The extent of Richard's involvement with UUCSJS is broad and deep: he was a former Vice-President of the Board of Trustees, Chair of a Ministerial Search Committee, Chair of the Social Justice Committee, and a member of the Caring Ministry Team. Membership and Sunday Service Committees, South Jersey Animal Advocates (then affiliated with UUCSJS), Finance Committee, and Choir. He has also been a frequent speaker and lay leader, both at UUCSJS and other congregations. Richard founded and led the Men's Group. He developed a four-part "UU History" service with four lay speakers from the Congregation. He served as a delegate to the 2010, 2011, and 2012 UUA General Assemblies, and has been an annual campaign canvasser. After completion of the UU Center, Richard pursued a Master of Divinity Degree with intention of becoming ordained as a Unitarian Universalist minister, but after completing three courses and seminars, he decided to place his energies elsewhere.

Richard has led the way for us in several areas, particularly those related to social justice. He volunteers with the South Jersey Animal Advocates, was the driving force behind Atlantic County's "Occupy" movement, and among other concerns, gave his time as Treasurer of the Atlantic City Long Term Recovery Group, providing aid to victims of Hurricane Sandy. He is also a member of the Atlantic County Secular Buddhist Community (Sangha).

In addition to Richard's enthusiasm and energy for social justice, he has enriched us greatly in many ways. For several years now, he has been living with cancer, showing us all by example how to live in anticipation of every day. He and Cynthia love their pet dog, and traveling to western Europe, especially England. Richard's other interests are varied, too: doing the New York Times Sunday crossword, sailing, science, diverse reading particularly historical novels, writing, anything Shakespeare, Sherlock Holmes, movies, homebuilding and repair, listening to music (ancient, classic, jazz, percussion), drumming, attending ballet, ballroom dancing, downhill skiing, animal rights, home cooking, and vegetarianism/veganism.

We are delighted that Richard is a UUCSJS member again!



Board of Trustees HIGHLIGHTS June 2016

The **regular monthly meeting** of the **UUCSJS Board of Trustees** was held on **Tuesday, June 14, 2016** at 6:30 pm in the Lounge at the UU Center, President Art Wexler presiding. Chalice lighting opened the meeting and joys and concerns were shared. Also present were Jim Gentile, newly elected to the Board, and outgoing Interim Minister, Cynthia Cain.

• **Reorganization**. Before taking up the regular agenda, a brief reorganization meeting was held to elect officers for FY 2016-17. Board members voted Jim Gentile as new UUCSJS President, and as Vice President, Melissa Hutchison. Also serving on the Board are Karen York, Treasurer; Judy Pereira, Secretary; and At-Large members Charlie Roberts, Damon Smith, and Art Wexler. The Board decided that regular monthly meetings will continue to be held on <u>the second Tuesday of each month at 6:30 pm</u> in the UU Center lounge.

Announcements

>Board Talk-Back. The next Talk-Back will be held <u>Sunday</u>, <u>July 10 at 11:15 am</u> in a downstairs classroom.

Correspondence. The secretary acknowledged receipt of thank-you letters from Family Promise of Atlantic County, Community FoodBank of NJ, and Tibetan Buddhist monks of Drepung Gomang Monastery, in exile in India.

• Reports

1) **Treasurer's Report**. Treasurer Karen York distributed her written report for June along with two additional budget documents, one condensed and the other complete for July 2015 to May 2016. The report showed account balances (5/31) as follows: TD Checking (Operating funds): <u>\$18,832.95</u>; TD Savings (CC3/Capital funds): <u>\$265.02</u>; and Fidelity/Capital Reserves: <u>\$2,788.64</u>. Prepayment of mortgage principal with CC3 funds was made on 5/25; the current principal balance on our mortgage = <u>\$241,841.54</u>.

NEW INTERIM MINISTER: A letter of agreement has been signed with Rev. John Marsh (First Unitarian Congregation of Ottawa, Canada) as our new interim minister, serving the congregation for one full year (8/15/16 to 8/15/17) with option to renew. Rev. Marsh will be visiting from July 17-19 to explore the area, meet people, and find housing.

TWO GRANTS: a) Joseph Priestley District (JPD) grant for <u>\$1,625.83</u>. UUCSJS was honored to be one of only two congregations in the district to receive a cash grant. No restrictions are placed on these funds, but JPD hopes they will be used for more outreach efforts. In his award letter JPD's Rev. David G. Pyle thanks UUCSJS for "your efforts to witness to the truth that Black Lives Matter," and tells us that JPD's Board "has been inspired by your commitment to witness for our faith in Southern NJ." He concludes: "We see you, and may you use this small grant to continue to be as bold and courageous as you have already shown yourselves to be."

b) UUA Funding Panel (Fund for UU Social Responsibility) grant for <u>\$8,000</u>. Rev. Cynthia Cain had applied for this grant in support of our anti-racism initiatives in the larger community and our partnership in sponsoring the year-long series of events entitled "Black Lives—AC: *Beyond the Slogan*; Conversations on Race, Privilege & Power." The UUCSJS Anti-Racism Task Force (ARTF) will administer these funds in cooperation with the treasurer; the ARTF is currently led by congregants Shelee McIlvaine and Michael Cluff.

END OF FISCAL YEAR REMINDERS: The treasurer reported that pledge reminders have duly been sent out. There is <u>\$10,619.67</u> in pledges still outstanding as of 6/9, she said, adding that she expects at least half of these monies to be paid before the end of the fiscal year (June 30), despite some predictable amount of "shrinkage" in each pledge period.

STEWARDSHIP: Current total in new pledging is \$144,465from 62 families (average of \$2,330 per family). "This is comparable to last year's numbers of \$148,130 from 69 committing families," the treasurer noted. Nine (9) new pledge units were added, and 27 families increased their pledges. "This is generous support considering our membership and attendance numbers are lower than last year," she observed (108 certified members, down from 115), "and several current members/friends have moved or are moving."

BUILDING USE REQUESTS: **a**) The Board voted to approve making building space available for the **Citizens' Climate Lobby (CCL) of Atlantic City** to meet in a downstairs classroom on <u>the second Saturday of each month from 12 noon to 2 pm</u> for a fee of \$50 per use. (CCL is a non-profit, non-partisan, 501c(3) group working "to build the political will to create a livable world.") **b) Earth & Sky Center of Many Paths** (formerly met at Smithville Community Center) has accepted our offer to meet on first and third Thursdays for a three-month trial period at \$50 per evening (beginning 6/16).

2) *Minister's Report*. Rev. Cain's written report was augmented by her comments on the vigil in memory of the victims in Orlando being planned for <u>Saturday, June 18 at 11 am</u> jointly with Rev. Blake Spencer of Ocean Heights Presbyterian. Also on Saturday: the June forum event at 2 pm at Asbury Methodist, this month on White Privilege.

3) **Staff & Committee Reports**. The secretary said that reports were sparse in June following Annual Reports in May.

• Discussion/Action Items

Geothermal System Repair. The president reported that he had been contacted by congregant Jeff Taylor regarding repairs being conducted on our geothermal heating & cooling system units. The treasurer confirmed that we have some \$1,500 in the budget for maintenance of the system, and Luoma noted that so far the system hasn't cost us anything since its installation in 2008.

<u>CONSENSUS</u>: It was the consensus of the Board that repairs should go forward on both geothermal units as needed.

Updates/Follow-Up

Office Assistant Position. It was agreed that we need to move forward in this matter as soon as possible in order to relieve volunteer Ronda Cluff, who has been capably producing the Midweek Announcements and Orders of Service, among other tasks, for several months now, with the help of our Congregational Bookkeeper, Kathleen Hartnett.

NEXT STEPS: A subcommittee composed of Kathleen Hartnett, Melissa Hutchison, Art Wexler, and if available, Shelee McIlvaine, will be deciding how to proceed.

Family Promise (UUFP & FPAC). As reported by UUFP Chair Deb Dagavarian, Family Promise of Atlantic County now expects us to begin hosting families in July. FPAC President Barbara Sabath will be delivering the message at the July 31 Sunday service. The efforts of congregants Janet Longo as organizer, and Colby Tippins' work on silent auction baskets, and other UU volunteers and attendees, contributed much to the success of FPAC's "Hope for Tomorrow" Gala at Frog Rock Golf & Country Club on Saturday, April 16 in Hammonton.

• **Adjournment** – Outgoing President Art Wexler thanked Board members for their cooperation during his tenure for the past two years, and the meeting adjourned at 9:00 pm.

Ministerial Search Committee Report

At the close of this new fiscal year and the beginning of the next, it seems appropriate to summarize in the Monthly Newsletter the work that was done by the Ministerial Search Committee since June 2015.

As the Committee has reported over the past few months, the Congregation's search for a called minister, to serve the Congregation on a ³/₄ time salary, did not result in the Committee finding a candidate which it could recommend to the Congregation to call. While this is disappointing, it also presents the Congregation with exciting challenges.

The search process caused us, as a community, to engage in a conscious assessment of who we are as a Congregation. It has made us examine who we perceive ourselves to be, both in our individual relationships to our community and within the context of the integral roles each of us has within the Congregation simply by choosing to be members of this community. Any such honest assessment leads to the conclusion that this is a Congregation that is nothing less than a treasure to each of us; a place which lends to us purpose, meaning, and renewal. As each of us can attest, these things are not easy to find; and it is hard work to nurture and to grow these things that call us here. Yet each time we engage with each other, we engage in that purposeful work of community; and we do so in the spirit of the rich and broad traditions of Unitarian Universalism.

So while the Ministerial Search Committee did not find a candidate which we could recommend to the Congregation, we anticipate that we will continue to search for a called minister during the coming year, as Rev. John Marsh serves in ministry with us, and we serve in ministry with him.

This continues to be an exciting time for our Congregation. Within this time come challenges. May we openly embrace these challenges; and in that embrace it is certain that we shall continue to find the purpose, the meaning and the renewal of this most treasured community.
