On **Sunday, January 1, 2017**, we will begin our week hosting homeless families. Several members of the UUCSJS Family Promise Team will be asking you how you'd like to help. We will have a sign-up sheet at a table in the back of the sanctuary, and a few of us will be there to answer your questions.

If you'd like to **prepare a dinner**, you will be asked to choose from 10 different meal suggestions. You will also select the evening you'd like to bring it (at about 6:00-6:30 pm). You may choose to eat with our guests, or leave if others are staying.

If you can fall asleep anywhere, please volunteer to **spend a night or two at the UU Center**. Overnight volunteers arrive at 9:00 pm, and leave early in the morning (you'll be sleeping either in the library or the sanctuary, on the same inflatable mattress/box spring that our guests will be using). We will need two overnight volunteers each night.

Maybe you just wish to **spend some time with our guests**, and will sign up to be present in the evening (either during or after dinner until the overnight crew arrives). You will follow the lead of our guests: if they want to talk, feel free to talk with them. But if they just want to be with their children, let them know you're fine with that.

Other volunteering options include bringing breakfast foods or lunch fixings. Our guests make their own breakfasts and lunches to bring with them. They will leave at 7:00 am, and return around dinnertime.

Board of Trustees HIGHLIGHTS

November 2016

The **regular monthly meeting** of the **UUCSJS Board of Trustees** was held on **Wednesday, November 9, 2016** (in place of 11/8 Election Day) at 6:30.

In addition to Rev. John Marsh, *ex-officio* member of the Board, also in attendance (for the first agenda item) were Family Promise team co-leaders, Debbi Dagavarian and Barb Morell.

>Agenda Items

• Family Promise (FP): Discussion of questions from FP about protocols. The UUFP team leaders began by describing in some detail how the program will run when we begin hosting guests [which we now know will be January 1, 2017!]. They explained that a Hospitality Logbook is kept with daily entries and updates on the (up to) 14 guests and their needs, including dietary restrictions. ITEM: It was agreed that in addition to the Logbook, we at UUCSJS should develop a "volunteer turn-over packet" with all necessary information about rules and protocols, the keys, etc.

The two then answered assorted inquiries from Board members before discussion turned to a list of **specific questions** submitted by UUFP in advance concerning such matters as where smoking would be allowed, and which spaces will be either locked or otherwise made off-limits to guests.

The president thanked Deb and Barb for coming out this evening, and the regular order of agenda was resumed.

• **Treasurer's Report**. Treasurer Karen York distributed her written report for November showing **account balances** (10/31) as follows: TD Checking (Operating funds): \$30,400.15; TD Savings (CC3/Capital funds): \$270.01; and Fidelity/Capital Reserves: \$13,537.52 (\$10,798.49 Operating). Prepayment of mortgage principal with CC3 funds was made on 10/26 in the amount of \$2,275.01; the current principal **balance on mortgage** = \$232,010.35 (11/9).

The treasurer confirmed that three necessary **bookkeeping tasks** were duly completed by October 31: **a)** Property tax exemption *filed* with Galloway Township by November 1, next due in 2019; **b)** Workers' Compensation audit *submitted* (but follow-up will be needed); and **c)** Congregational Record financial information *updated* for *the* Ministerial Search committee.

- -Building use requests. The treasurer stated that there were inquiries in the pipeline but no action was required.
- **Secretary's Report**. The secretary reported for the record that DRE Heidi Jannsch informed the congregation via the UU listserv on 11/9/16 that the children's "Trick or Treat" **second collection** on Sun., October 30 raised **\$1,168.85** in cash donations (*in addition to* foodstuffs), to benefit Community FoodBank of New Jersey. *Wonderful effort!*
- Minister's Report. Rev. Marsh began by noting that last Sunday's guest speaker, Rev. Rebekah Montgomery [Military Chaplain, currently Assistant Minister, UU Congregation of Rockville, MD], seemed very well received, with a record recent attendance of 84. John recalled that he and his wife, Allison, attended the Mainland/Pleasantville NAACP awards dinner on Saturday, October 29, at which UUCSJS was the group's 2016 honoree in the "Organization/Business" category. Rev. Cynthia Cain, our Interim Minister 2014-16, was also in attendance, along with some 20 members of the congregation.

Rev. Marsh noted that this coming Sunday we will be welcoming **three** (3) **new members**—*Erica Onofrio*, and *Steve* & *Palma Merkel*—and that he will be hosting an informal **reception for visitors** in the Library right after the service, together with representatives of the Membership committee. Planning for the **Christmas service** is now in progress, he said,

and will include a **special offering** to provide a new freezer for the soup kitchen at Asbury United Methodist Church in Atlantic City. Members of the Men's Club have been volunteering to help serve at Asbury's Saturday brunch.

Finally, Rev. Marsh observed that there seems to be a need for **improved means of communication** within our congregation; that it can be difficult to get the word out because there are multiple channels—Midweeks, UU listserv, website, Facebook, newsletter, pulpit, bulletin board, more—and no single-source way to access and coordinate these channels. It was mentioned that different people tend to look at different sites, complicating the picture. While some who are very active seem to have developed effective means to communicate among themselves, others may find this more difficult. It was noted that many including those in leadership positions are not on Facebook, further adding to the complexity. NEXT STEPS: No remedies were proposed at this meeting; however, it was suggested that **communications issues** might be taken up by the **long-range planning team**, or by a special group for this purpose.

• Three-Year Strategic Plan Update—Preliminaries.

Art Wexler, who along with Charlie Roberts volunteered to help lead the Board's effort to create a new long-range strategic plan, stated that he began work in the belief that "it's important for this process to be driven by a **needs statement**, to enable the congregation to come to terms with its identity—who we are, and how that lends itself to us in the future." Their UUCSJS Strategic Planning Concept Document was circulated to Board members in advance. Wexler further stated that he sees the effort informed by a **high level of dialogue** with a cross-section of the congregation, including all major stakeholders. The resulting three-year strategic plan will needs be an accurate reflection of our renewed mission and vision together with a set of realistic, achievable, and measurable goals. NEXT STEPS In her role as head of Program Council, Melissa Hutchison will put out an open solicitation inviting those interested to come forward and become part of the long-range planning team. Depending on response, direct invitations might then be made.

- Requested proposal from RJTF re \$8,000 UUA grant. The president reported that he had attended the RJTF meeting on October 20 and requested a **budget proposal** by November 15. **Straw poll results** were shared. The group is at work on a **new BLM sign** for re-dedication, among other plans.
- Discussion of *Concerns* raised at October 2 session on Racial Justice/Social Justice issues.

President Gentile said that he put this on the agenda to provide time for the Board to reflect on the Concerns voiced at the October 2 session (written anonymously on Post-It notes, read aloud by facilitator Rev. Libby Smith, and later transcribed by the secretary). On most of these, no action was seen to be required, but that it was important to have held a forum in which they could be heard. There were many types of concerns expressed, with some touching on safety and security. NEXT STEPS: While it was noted that several measures to improve safety and security had been enacted, including surveillance cameras, front entry monitor, and modifying sanctuary exit doors, more may be needed. A comprehensive evacuation drill was held last fall coordinated by Shelee McIlvaine, Heidi Jannsch, Jesse Connor, and others, and Rev. Marsh strongly recommended that another be held as soon as possible, along with other measures such as suitable attention to serious threat scenarios.


After extinguishing the chalice, the meeting adjourned at 8:16.

Dr. William J. Barber II. President of the North Carolina chapter of the NAACP and pastor at Greenleaf Christian Church in Goldsboro, North Carolina, Rev. Barber is the architect of the Forward Together Moral Movement that gained national acclaim with its Moral Monday protests. We will facilitate a 90-minute discussion of The Third Reconstruction on Friday, January 27 at 6:30 pm at the UU Center. From <u>uuabookstore.org</u>: Over the summer of 2013, the Reverend Dr. William J. Barber II led more than a hundred thousand people at rallies across North Carolina to protest restrictions to voting access and an extreme makeover of state government. These protests-the largest state government-focused civil disobedience campaign in American history-came to be known as Moral Mondays and have since blossomed in states as diverse as Florida, Tennessee, Wisconsin, Ohio, and New York.

At a time when divide-and-conquer politics are exacerbating racial strife and economic inequality, Rev. Barber offers an impassioned, historically grounded argument that Moral Mondays are hard evidence of an embryonic Third Reconstruction in America.

The first Reconstruction briefly flourished after Emancipation, and the second Reconstruction ushered in meaningful progress in the civil rights era. But both were met by ferocious reactionary measures that severely curtailed, and in many cases rolled back, racial and economic progress. This Third Reconstruction is a profoundly moral awakening of justice-loving people united in a fusion coalition powerful enough to reclaim the possibility of democracy-even in the face of corporate-financed extremism.

In this memoir of how Rev. Barber and allies as diverse as progressive Christians, union members, and immigration-rights activists came together to build a coalition, he offers a trenchant analysis of race-based inequality and a hopeful message for a nation grappling with persistent racial and economic injustice. Rev. Barber writes movingly-and pragmatically-about how he laid the groundwork for a state-by-state movement that unites black, white, and brown, rich and poor, employed and unemployed, gay and straight, documented and undocumented, religious and secular. Only such a diverse fusion movement, Rev. Barber argues, can heal our nation's wounds and produce public policy that is morally defensible, constitutionally consistent, and economically sane. The Third Reconstruction is both a blueprint for movement building and an inspiring call to action from the twenty-first century's most effective grassroots organizer.
