Shakespeare's Richard II With Rev. John Marsh Sunday nights at 6 pm in the sanctuary January 15, 29 and Feb. 5

This is a story about an unhappy transition of power. It brings to mind Michelle Obama's comments about going low and going high. (Richard insists that those who would depose him must rise to his level; his deposers insist that he must lower himself to theirs). There is also much allusion to the sun and to gardens. Issues of power and powerlessness are a focus.

No prior knowledge of the play or Shakespeare is necessary. We will: go over the plots and subplots and talk about the issues they raise; read some of the scenes aloud to each other (bring a copy of your complete Shakespeare if you have one – there will be extras on hand); and watch portions of professional performances.
