June 2 Annual Congregational Meeting	Why is it so Hard to Show Love? <i>Rev. Dawn Fortune</i> It is often said that the world needs love more than almost anything else, and yet is the thing that is so hard to express. How many of us were taught how to show love? Can we separate love from romance and sexuality in our US culture, so infused with the message that those things are hopelessly entwined? Another question unanswered from the Question Box sermon, this query needed its own sermon all to itself. Join us for an exploration of our own hearts.

June 23 Murray Grove weekend	LGBTQ Pride: Stonewall After 50 Years <i>Led by Interweave</i> In 1969, patrons at the Stonewall Inn nightclub in Greenwich Village fought back when police tried to arrest them for congregating in a place known to be frequented by homosexuals. They fought back each night for a week, causing riots that coincided with last call at area gay bars. This uprising marked what is commonly understood to be the beginnings of the modern LGBTQ liberation movement and is celebrated with pride parades worldwide. Members of the UUCSJS chapter of Interweave, the UU LGBTQ member group, will share their experiences of living as queer people in our community.
June 30	Coffeehouse Worship Led by Barbara Miller UUCSJS Music Director Barbara Miller will coordinate a coffeehouse style worship service with musicians and words to heal and inspire.

Gentle People,

Summer has launched itself upon us with vigor in these last weeks of May, and the weeks ahead promise more sunshine and hot weather.

General Assembly (GA) begins in two weeks in Spokane, Washington,

where Unitarian Universalists from the United States and Canada will gather to do the official business of the denomination. I am honored to be leading worship on Saturday evening the 22^{nd} (7 to 8:30 pm), which you will be able to watch via live-stream on the internet if you would like. My speaking part is only about 5 minutes, but I plan to make those five minutes count for as much as I can.

While at GA, I will attend a luncheon hosted by the folks behind the Wake Now Our Vision program to celebrate the generosity of the congregation in Shelter Rock, NY. that is funding the program. For those who are new or who might not have heard of it, the UUA, through a grant from the philanthropic work of the Shelter Rock UU Congregation, offered a matching funds program to encourage legacy giving to congregations and UU organizations. Legacy giving is giving that happens after a person has died, when their assets are disbursed according to their will. The Wake Now Our Vision program provided 10 percent immediate matching funds to organizations that people named in their wills up to \$10,000 per donor. So someone who leaves \$20,000 to the congregation or another UU organization in their will would qualify for that congregation or organization to receive \$2,000 in matching funds which will be



distributed later this year. The UUCSJS was one of the most successful congregations to participate in the campaign, bringing in over a half-million dollars in pledged gifts, and qualifying the congregation to receive in the neighborhood of \$52,000 in unrestricted matching funds. The UUA Giving people asked me to speak at the luncheon about our participation in the program and what the coming windfall might mean for our future. I am delighted to be representing us in this way.

There is still time for those who are interested to register to be delegates to the General Assembly. I believe the UUCSJS qualifies for two delegates, besides me (an automatic delegate because I'm a minister serving the congregation). If you are a delegate, you can participate from home via live stream on the computer, even making comments and asking questions during the plenary sessions and casting votes from home. It is a fascinating exercise in our democratic process: imperfect, but holy and genuine. Please see me or Melissa Hutchison for more details on how to be a delegate.

General Assembly next year will be in Providence, RI. I would love to see a large group of members from the UUCSJS attend and participate in the workshops and plenary sessions. Let's keep thinking and talking about that!

After I return from GA, I will begin my summer break. I have the last week of June off as one of my regular weeks off, and then will take July off to do some vacation things and some reading and studying up for the coming church year. While I am away during that time, I will not be answering emails or phone calls until I return to the office on August 1.

Worship over the summer will include several special music-based services, some guest ministers from other parts of the country, and services led by groups and committees from within the UUCSJS. I will return to the pulpit again in September, after Labor Day weekend.

Our Annual Murray Grove Retreat will be held this year from Friday, June 21 through Sunday, June 23, 2019. Murray Grove is an important historical site in our Universalism heritage with a history dating back to the 1700's. We are fortunate to be located so close to this special place and this gathering is an opportunity to relax, get to know one another better, and explore our Universalist roots. Friday night we will have a BBQ and potluck dinner and campfire.

Letter to the Congregation from Melissa Hutchison, President, UUCSJS Board of Trustees May 23rd, 2019

Fellow Congregants,

I am writing this letter to you to update you on a recent incident that happened at the UU Center.

Sometime early in the AM on May 3rd, 2019, someone stole multiple (four) security cameras from the outside of our building. Our large rainbow flag was also stolen, and an attempt was made to deface our Black Lives Matter sign. No one noticed that anything was amiss until Monday, May 6th, when Kathleen Hartnett entered the building for her work shift that day. There have been several attempts to remove our rainbow flags, some successful and some not, some prior to and some following the theft of the cameras. The local Galloway police were notified, and an incident report was filled out. A detective was assigned to the case, and was given information from Kathleen, Ronda Cluff, and myself. Video footage from our security cameras was viewed by staff as well as by the detective, and the only image that was detected was an image of a gloved hand. Because there were no images of a person or of a car, the likelihood of the suspect being apprehended is slim.

To be clear, there were no breaches in the existing security system; there were no attempts made to enter the building. There was no "break-in", and the alarm system to alert us to motion in the building or opening of various doors was working. We did not notice that the cameras were down until later as they are not tied into our central building alarm system. The outside cameras that we had been using were purchased by a UUCSJS member, and installed by other members of the congregation. Up until they were stolen, the outside cameras were functioning as originally intended. They are not linked to the Schuler inside alarm system.

Since the incident, the board of directors, Rev Dawn, staff, and several UUCSJS members have had conversations about the status of our existing security system, and we have been working on options to improve our security of the UU building. We have used Schuler Security system for several years, and they operate and maintain the security system that is inside our building. Schuler was invited to come out to the UU Center to assess our needs for security outside the building. On their most recent visit, Schuler advised that we wait to replace our outside rainbow flag until we have made a more comprehensive security plan. We fully intend to replace the rainbow flag as soon as possible.

We expect to get a quote from Schuler Security sometime in the next several days, and we will also seek competing bids from other security companies, if warranted. We believe that the issues involved here are important to many of our congregants and I will be available to discuss any questions that anyone has this coming Sunday, May 26th, after services.


Classroom Spotlight: Heeding the Call

The remaining class in Children's Religious Education to be in the spotlight this year is Heeding the Call. This class offered our teens a unique opportunity to develop skills as Unitarian Universalists committed to social justice. Organized as a once a month workshop, the teens came together to learn about injustice, hear inspirational stories, learn what it means to be an ally, and gain the skills and tools necessary to help create change.

The first workshop raised the teens' awareness of the many injustices in the world. They began creating a Justicemaker's Guide they would build upon in future workshops. The guide included tools that describe the spheres of influence, an oppression continuum, and Maslow's hierarchy of needs, as well as journaling space, and resources on how to be an ally.

Workshops 2 and 3 inspired the teens with stories of Unitarian Universalists who acted against injustice and they learned how art can be a nonviolent tool to bring awareness and change. They learned in Workshop 4 that taking action can sometimes involve risks, like arrest, damage to personal property, and even injury. There was a lively discussion that day! Workshop 5 focused on courage,what it is and how to have it-- a much needed tool in fighting injustice. In their final workshop of the year, they learned about Wahat al-Salam/Neve Shalom (Oasis of Peace), a village in Israel that is an intentional Arab-Jewish community committed to multicultural equality and sustainable peace. From this example, the teens learned that hope and dedication are essential tools in the fight against injustice.

In the final weeks of our regular RE year, the teens began a project to audit the social justice actions of our UUCSJS community. With end of the year obligations and the need to plan their yearly RE Sunday Service, the teens were unable to complete this audit. However, they are still very enthusiastic about the project and hope to be able compete it soon.
